Message from the President of the Board



Message from the Board Youth Representative



2021 was a year that embodied transition. Some of the previous COVID-19 restrictions were lifted, and it was an opportunity for several of the youth centered programs to take place in person once again.

This set the stage for 2022 where, just prior to the writing of this message, we were able to hold the annual Youth Leadership Training Weekend in person

for the first time in two years. The youth had a wonderful time in getting the opportunity to practice skills such as independently using transit, navigating a shopping mall, and learning vital skills that further allows four development of important skill sets.

Many virtual programs such as Creating Confidence and Kids Connect continued throughout 2021. These programs allowed for the youth to connect with one another, as well as gain valuable volunteering experience despite how far they are located from one another. Throughout the year, we also relaunched monthly Youth Leadership meetings, in which youth leaders are able to gather to hear about exciting volunteering opportunities within Blind Beginnings, learn about important leadership qualities, and make lasting connections with one another.

Overall, although this year brought some uncertainty during a transitional period, it allowed for some wonderful opportunities for the youth to experience new and exciting things both through our virtual and in person programming, and I am confident that the upcoming year will be no different.

Our theory of change requires parents, children, teachers and society to adopt a positive perspective of blindness. When this happens, children and youth who are blind or partially sighted will live a more fulfilling life. Blind Beginnings, through its programs and services, is working toward a world where seeing things differently inspires limitless possibilities, where children can reach their potential, without being held back by perceived limitations.

We're Changing Perspectives

Historically, people have negative stereotypes of blindness, lacking the understanding of the abilities of people who are blind. Even parents of a child who is blind or partially sighted can have these negative stereotypes and doubts that their child can grow up to be independent, capable and employable, resulting in feelings of hopelessness.

This greater understanding will result in parents being more likely to already know a positive blind role model when their child is born. resulting in parents' views of blindness being more accurate, less negative and deficit based. They will assume their child who is blind will be able to achieve the same things as a sighted child. With these raised expectations, they will encourage and support their child to pursue their dreams and goals.

Children and youth are empowered and confident in their abilities. Society has a greater acceptance and understanding which leads to inclusivity and people who are blind being integrated into a wide range of jobs and all aspects of society.





This program, originally called Baby Beginnings, is offered in partnership with **Vision Loss Rehab BC**, and was designed for parents raising babies who are blind or partially sighted under 2 years of age. When it became a virtual program we opened it up to focus on families with children 5 years and younger and incorporated **Adam's Accessible Story Time**. In May of 2021 we added a hands-on activity targeted toward preschool aged children and we re-branded the program Early Beginnings. Families who register each month receive the activity supplies in the mail and join us on Zoom to listen to Adam's stories and do an accessible activity that involves the whole family.

PROGRAM NEED

We believe that connecting with parents at an early stage may help to shift a negative perception of blindness to one of possibility. Through stories, songs, and hands-on craft making, parents of babies, toddlers and preschoolers learn how to make these activities come alive for their children and to connect with other parents also raising a baby with a vision impairment.

We offer Early Beginnings and Accessible Story Time as part of a contract for service with

PROGRAM GOALS

- Provide information and resources for parents from a Vision Specialist from Vision Loss Rehabilitation Canada.
- Give parents an opportunity to socialize babies and introduce them to songs and stories.
- Provide emotional support to parents and reduce feelings of isolation.
- To raise parents' expectations of their child so they support their child in reaching his/her potential.
- To provide Blind Beginnings families with opportunities to meet each other to learn from and support each other.





PROGRAM NEED

Community Discovery was created to address serious issues children who are blind or partially sighted face growing up - they often have unnecessary limits placed on them by teachers, society and even their own families who are trying to protect them from getting hurt or don't know how to adapt an activity to be done without sight. As a result, children who are blind or partially sighted often grow up not participating in physical activity at school and are hesitant to try new experiences. This impacts their self-confidence, their physical health and their social and emotional health. Community Discovery provides children who are blind or partially sighted with the time and opportunities for hands-on exploration, which they require in order to learn new concepts in the world or experience a new activity.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To raise the personal expectations of children who are blind or partially sighted with respect to what they believe they can do, leading to increased selfconfidence and new skills development.
- To provide a hands-on means for children and youth who are blind or partially sighted to learn basic concepts, at their own pace.
- To provide children who are blind or partially sighted with opportunities to improve motor skills and build interest in lifelong physical activity by experiencing sports and leisure activities with their families.
- To raise parents' expectations of their child so they support their child in reaching his/her potential.
- To provide Blind Beginnings families with opportunities to meet each other to learn from and support each other.

2021 DISCOVERIES

- Continued our popular Baking with Blind Beginnings
 Program where we made such treats as EatMore Bars,
 Mini Egg Cookies, and Carrot Cake.
- Attended a virtual interactive Indigenous Storytelling Workshop hosted by 3 Crows Productions
- Gathered in person at the Reifel Bird Sanctuary in Metro Vancouver
- Partnered with VocalEye and enjoyed an "almost live" production virtual production of Alice in Wonderland
- Attended a Learn to Fish Program, put on by the Fraser Valley Trout Hatchery
- Experienced Project Fire Flower, an interactive art exhibition showed us the full experience of fireworks through touch, hearing, and vision





CREATING CONFIDENCE

The Creating Confidence Program was designed to help children and youth who are blind or partially sighted build self-confidence, self-acceptance and independence. Over a series of workshop sessions, children learn to develop skills and confidence. Some of the topics covered are Independent Living Skills, technology use, how to use and understand body language, facial expressions, gestures, and personal space. They also learn how to prepare their look according to the social situation, how to help others feel at ease with their visual impairment, and how to behave in a variety of social and professional settings.

PROGRAM NEED

For children approaching adolescence, fitting-in becomes important and often youth look to their friends and peers to build confidence and self-acceptance. Youth who are blind or partially sighted don't have this point of reference, so developing personal style can be very challenging. Youth who are blind or partially sighted face many challenges that hinder their career success. This can be attributed to many factors including: low self-confidence, social challenges, and misconceptions held by employers and the general public about the abilities and potential of people who are blind or partially sighted.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To fill the gaps in what youth learn in school including independent living skills
- To boost self-acceptance and confidence.
- To learn how to effectively communicate with sighted peers
- To develop friendships with peers who are blind or partially sighted
- To help youth who are blind or partially sighted take steps toward career choice and successful employment.
- To teach youth who are blind about how and when to disclose their disability during the employment process.
- To make available confidence and skill-building workshops to all children and youth who are blind or partially sighted in BC
- To provide children and families with opportunities to meet each other and benefit from shared experience and peer support

2021 WORKSHOPS

- Real Talk Teen. Topics in this program included personal style, dating or flirting, navigating social situations and personal hygiene.
- Mental Toughness Workshop. This workshop was offered to teens to build psychological strength and mental toughness to battle life's challenges, especially in the time of a pandemic.
- Independent Living Skills Workshop. Learning independent living skills is critical for young people who are blind or partially sighted to build their confidence and prepare them to live independently.
- Improv Workshop. Newly created in 2021, this Workshop helps youth develop public speaking skills, social skills, build confidence, and create connections in a fun, lighthearted environment.





A first-of-its-kind in BC, the Youth Leadership & Pre-employment Program prepares youth who are blind or partially sighted for their future transition to work and adult life. While the youth build employment and life skills, they also learn to see their true abilities and to not be held back by limits set by others. The program is designed to provide direct training and practical experience in leadership, team building, public speaking, communication, and career planning and also provides them with opportunities to volunteer in order to help build valuable skills and confidence.

PROGRAM NEED

Youth who are blind or partially sighted face many challenges that hinder their career success, as indicated by the national unemployment rate of approximately 70 percent. While there are employment readiness training programs for individuals with disabilities, there are no other programs specific to blindness or visual impairment. Furthermore, youth who are blind or partially sighted often experience low self-confidence and social challenges that negatively impact their search for employment and career development.

This program has helped me immensely throughout my teenage years and will continue to impact me for the rest of my life.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To provide youth who are blind or partially sighted with skill-building training and practical experience that supports their employability and career success.
- To help youth who are blind or partially sighted set higher personal goals and increase self-confidence to improve their chances of employability and career success.
- To teach youth who are blind or partially sighted how to put their friends, co-workers, bosses and others at ease with their blindness to support their success at work.
- To educate the public about blindness to increase expectations and inclusivity for youth who are blind in the workplace and in the community.

YOUTH VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES 2021

- Creating Connections Workshops. Youth Leaders helped to plan our Creating Connections Workshop that runs the last Friday of each month. These workshops are an opportunity for youth to socialize and enjoy each other's company over a shared activity.
- Harry Potter Book Club. Each week participants would join the Zoom room to listen to a couple of chapters read by two of our Alumni.
 Participants would sign up to be a guest reader and read the lines of a certain character in the book.
- **Kids Connect.** Youth leaders were invited to our Kids Connect program which is a support group for children 7-12. Youth Leaders came to act as role models, lead activities and connect with the kids.
- **Virtual Summer Camp.** Due to the COVID-19 restrictions in British Columbia, we held a virtual camp this summer. Youth Leaders and Alumni were welcomed to camp to act as role models and lead activities. Their support helped in creating connections among kids, teens and families.
- **Contributing to Limitless Content.** This includes writing blog articles for the Limitless Blog and co-hosting duties on the Limitless Podcast.
- Educational Public Speaking About Blindness. Providing blindness presentations in the community.





Blind Beginnings' Summer Camp Program offers children and youth who are blind or partially sighted opportunities to challenge personal limits, develop new skills and increase self-confidence through summer camps and physical activities. Through observation, parents begin to see their child's true capacities and lift unnecessary limits, thus allowing the child to develop undiscovered talents and increase independence.

PROGRAM NEED

Children who are blind or partially sighted often have unnecessary limits placed on them by teachers, society and even their own families. As a result, these children can underestimate their own abilities, which can directly impact their physical pursuits. When children who are blind or partially sighted are not given the opportunity to try physical challenges at a young age, they often grow up hesitant to try new experiences, thus impacting their self-confidence.

PROGRAM GOALS

- To raise the personal expectations of children and youth who are blind or partially sighted, with respect to what they believe they can do, leading to increased self-confidence and new skills development.
- To raise parents' expectations of their child to support them in reaching their full potential.
- To provide families with opportunities to meet other families to learn from and support each other.
- To increase community awareness about how children who are blind learn, thus leading to increased inclusivity in public programs and venues.
- To challenge physical limits and improve physical strength, thereby increasing overall interest in physical activities.





VIRTUAL SUMMER CAMP 2021

We were once again prevented from holding our annual **Camp Hornby** or **Family Adventure Camps** in 2021 as overnight camps were still banned due to COVID restrictions. As disappointing as this was, we instead held a week long 'Virtual Summer Camp' that was full of activities for all ages and that culminated in an in-person evening Campfire Sing-A-Long. Because we were in the middle of a summertime fire ban, we weren't able to have a real campfire, but we got creative and were able to bask in the warm glow of some LED lights wrapped around a collection of firewood instead.



COUNSELLING & SUPPORT

Today in British Columbia, there are approximately 750 families raising children who are blind or partially sighted and 45 additional families each year with children who are newly diagnosed. Blind Beginnings wants to ensure that families have access to available early intervention support, children have a place to connect with their peers, and that all families know where to get information and can connect with blindness professionals and other families who have begun the journey before them.

PROGRAM NEED

When their child is diagnosed as blind, most parents usually experience a period of mourning and a deep sense of loss for the life they imagined their child would live. The quality and frequency of services provided to new parents depends greatly on where they live, which community organizations they are referred to, and the level of education and experience of the professionals within those organizations.

- Reduce feelings of isolation
- Connect with others with shared life experience
- Provide emotional support
- Suggest coping strategies
- Build a community
- Provide resources
- Create opportunity for social interaction

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

Blind Beginnings' financial position remained strong during 2021. We were grateful to have continued to receive funding and financial support from our donors and grantors during the second year of the pandemic. We also received financial support through Government wage subsidies. We continued to provide service for Early Intervention support as a subcontractor through a contract with **Vision Loss Rehab BC** and the **Ministry of Children and Family Development**. Blind Beginnings also earned revenue from membership fees, workshop fees and through fundraising events.

The total revenue for 2021 was \$413,892 and the total expenses were \$404,523 which left us with an excess of revenue over expenses of \$9,369.

Blind Beginnings saw an increase in overall expenses in 2021 compared to 2020 as we invested in building our systems and in building organizational capacity with the hiring of an additional staff member.
